Special Notes:

Intakes were much lower than previous years at the beginning of the year as we were in the middle of the remodel. These numbers picked up a lot as soon as we had the extra space. If we had the space from the beginning, I think our adoption numbers would have been even higher this year. We also implemented the online Courtesy Listings through PetFinder at the beginning of this year – we know several pets on our wait list found homes through this without ever having to come to the shelter. Even with these things in mind, there were only 18 less adoptions than the previous year. We anticipate this number to be much higher next year now that we have
